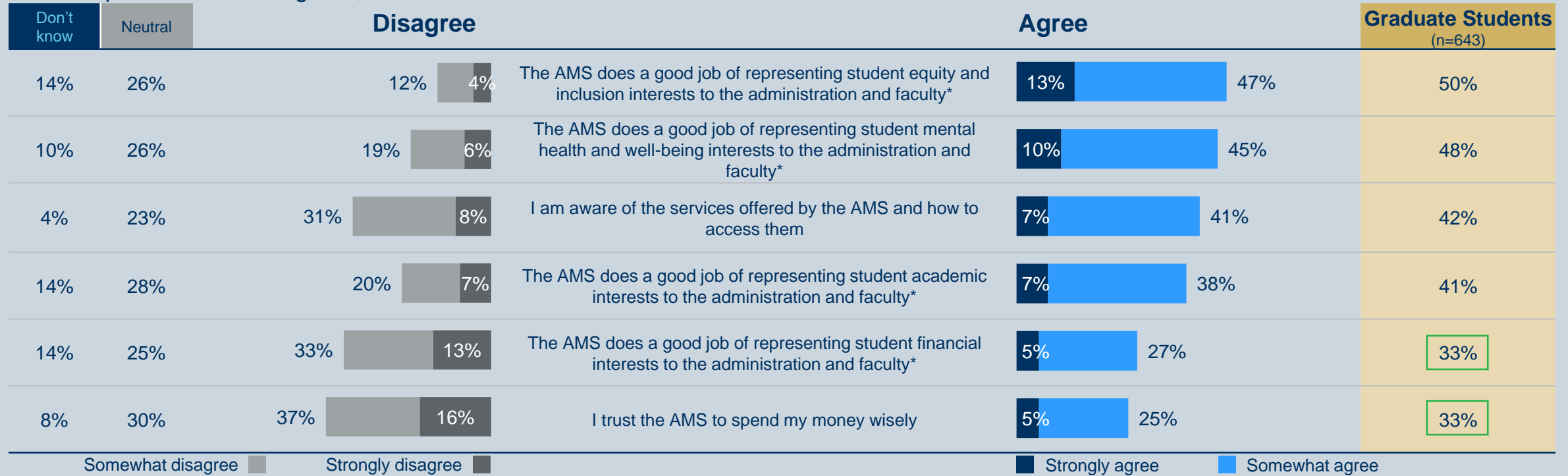


Agreement with Statements About the AMS

Close to half of students agree that AMS does a good job of representing student interests related to equity/inclusion and mental health/well-being. Students show disagreement with how their money is being spent and how AMS advocates for their financial interests; although there are also a high proportion of neutral opinions across all statements. Graduate students were significantly more likely to agree about these financial points than undergrads, but not much more.

AMS1. To what extent do you agree with the following statements about the AMS?



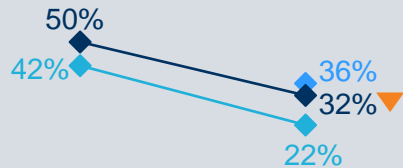
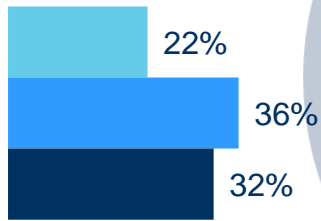

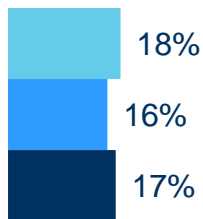
Overall, I am satisfied with my university experience

Agreement with Statements About Satisfaction with UBC: *Continued*

Satisfaction with university experience and value perceptions have declined for both international and domestic students, though more significantly for international students, likely caused by course changes due to the pandemic.

- Domestic (BC, Lower Mainland)

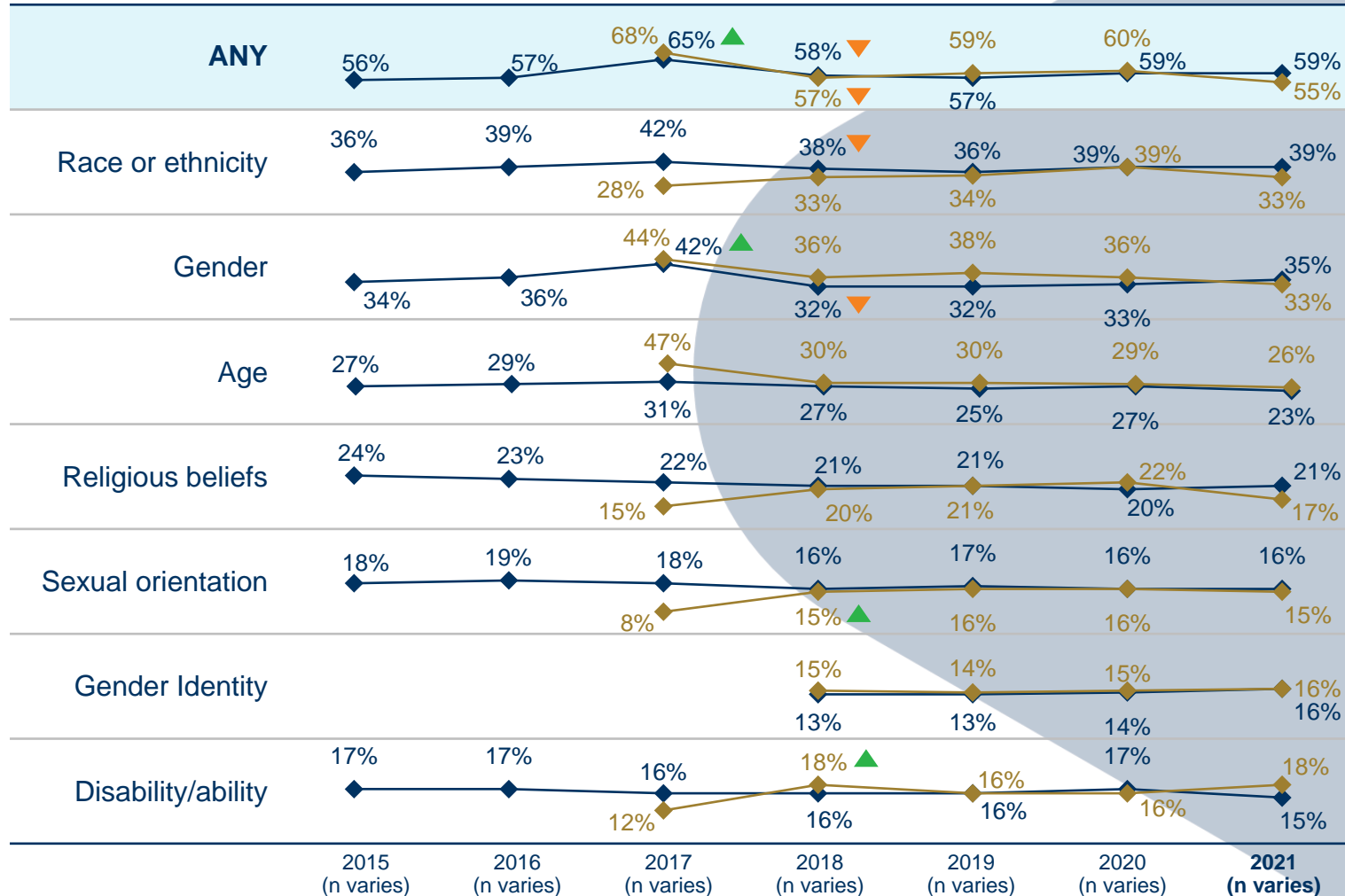

Frequency of Experiencing Types of Discrimination by Demographic Groups

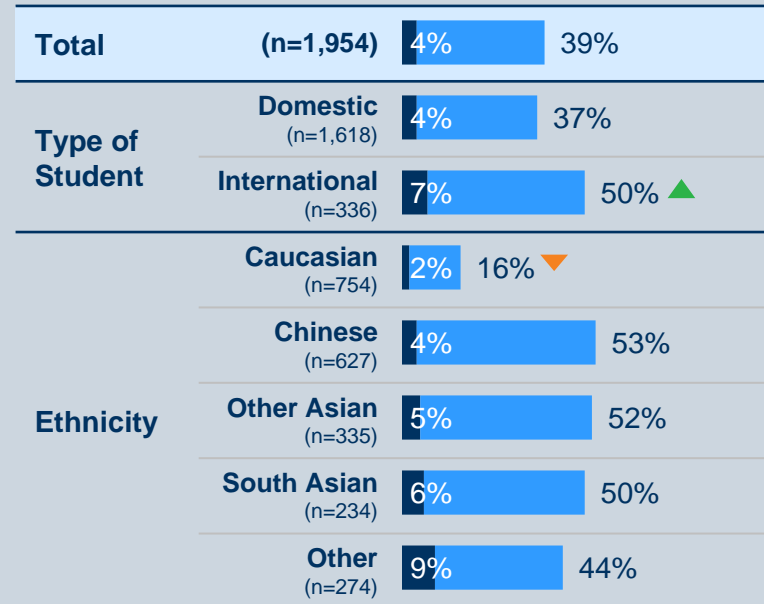
International students are significantly more likely to experience racial or ethnic discrimination as well as those with ethnicities other than Caucasian.

LGBTQ2PA+ are significantly more likely to experience sexual orientation discrimination.

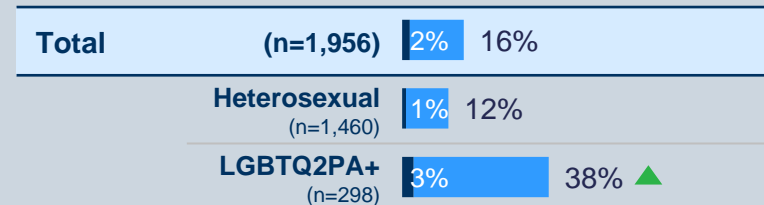
Women are significantly more likely to experience gender discrimination.

Those age 25 or older are significantly more likely to experience age discrimination than those who are less than 20 years old.

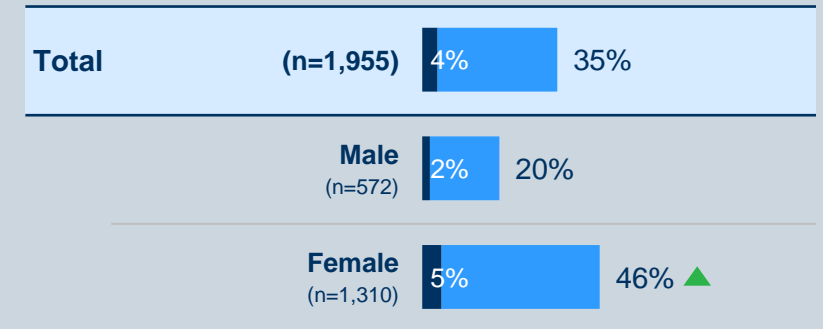
RACIAL/ETHNIC DISCRIMINATION



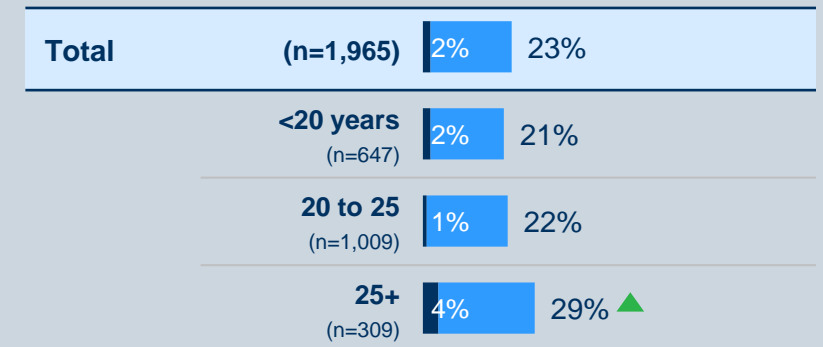
SEXUAL ORIENTATION DISCRIMINATION

AGE DISCRIMINATION

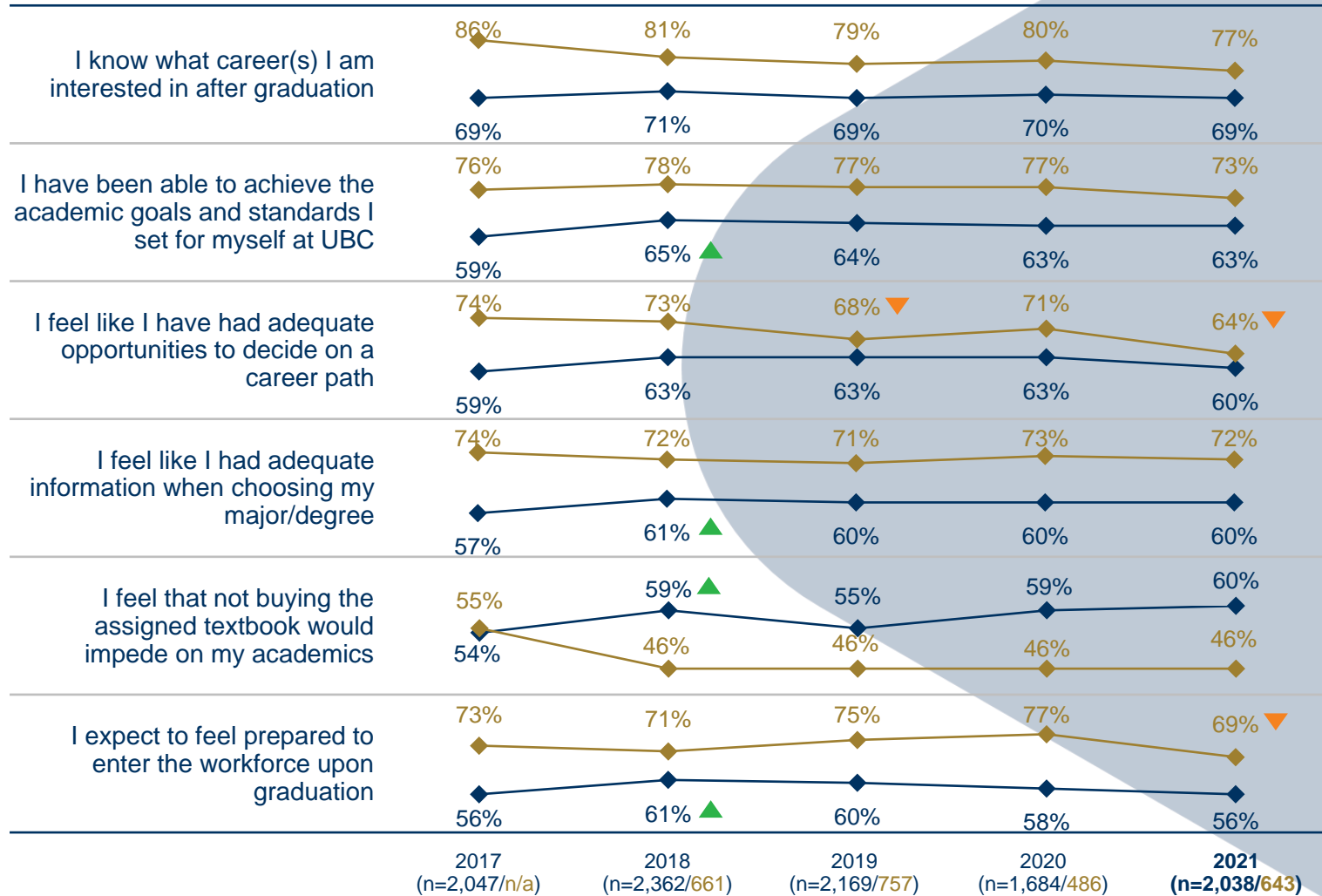

Agreement with Statements about UBC Education: Year Over Year

Compared to last year, significantly less graduates agree that they had adequate opportunities to decide on a career path as well as expect to feel prepared to enter the workforce upon graduation.

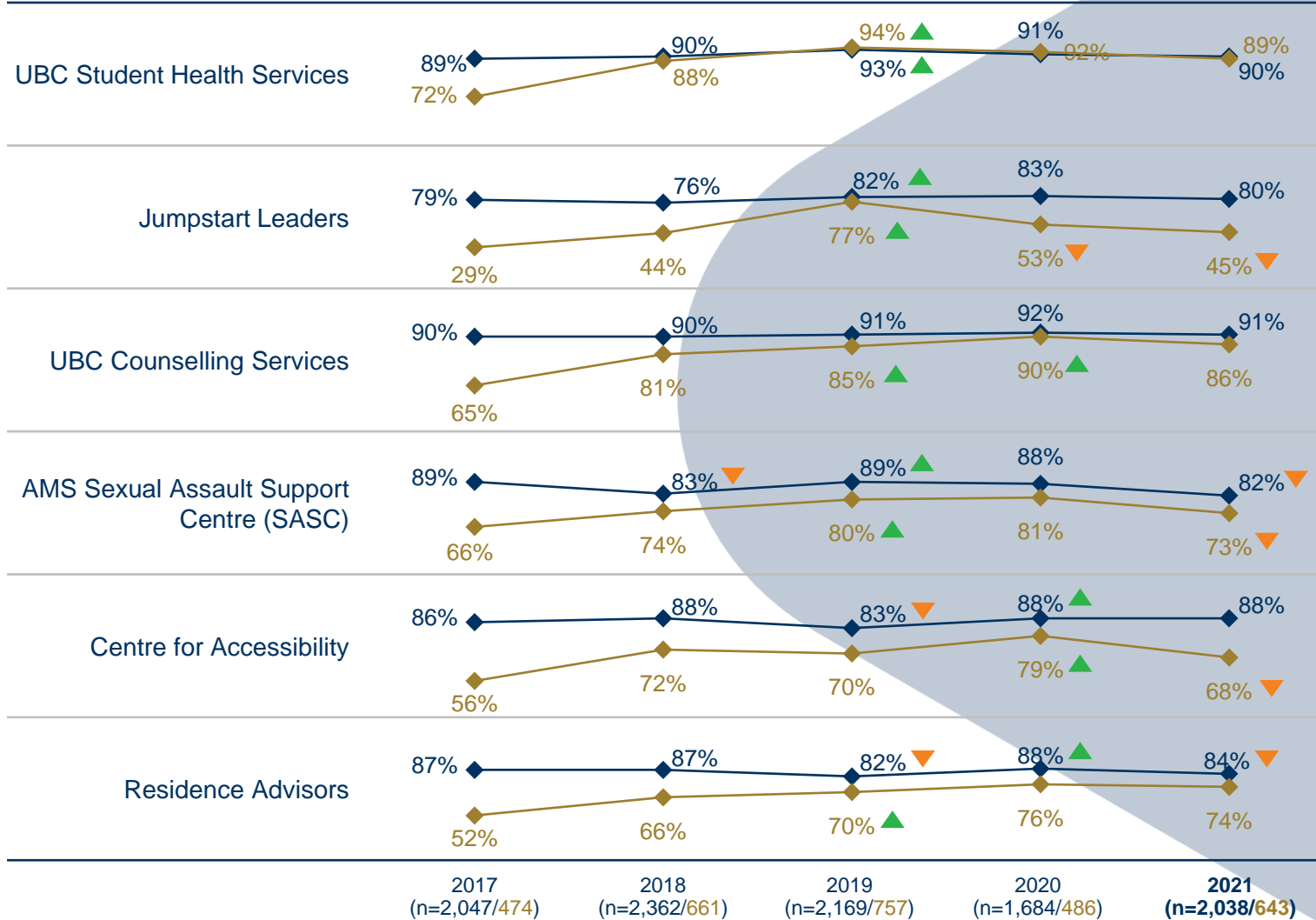
Undergraduate agreement has stayed stable.

Awareness of UBC Mental Health/Well-Being Services & Programs

Awareness of SASC and residence advisors has significantly declined over the past year among undergrads. For graduates, there were significant declines in awareness of Jumpstart Leaders, SASC, and Centre for Accessibility.

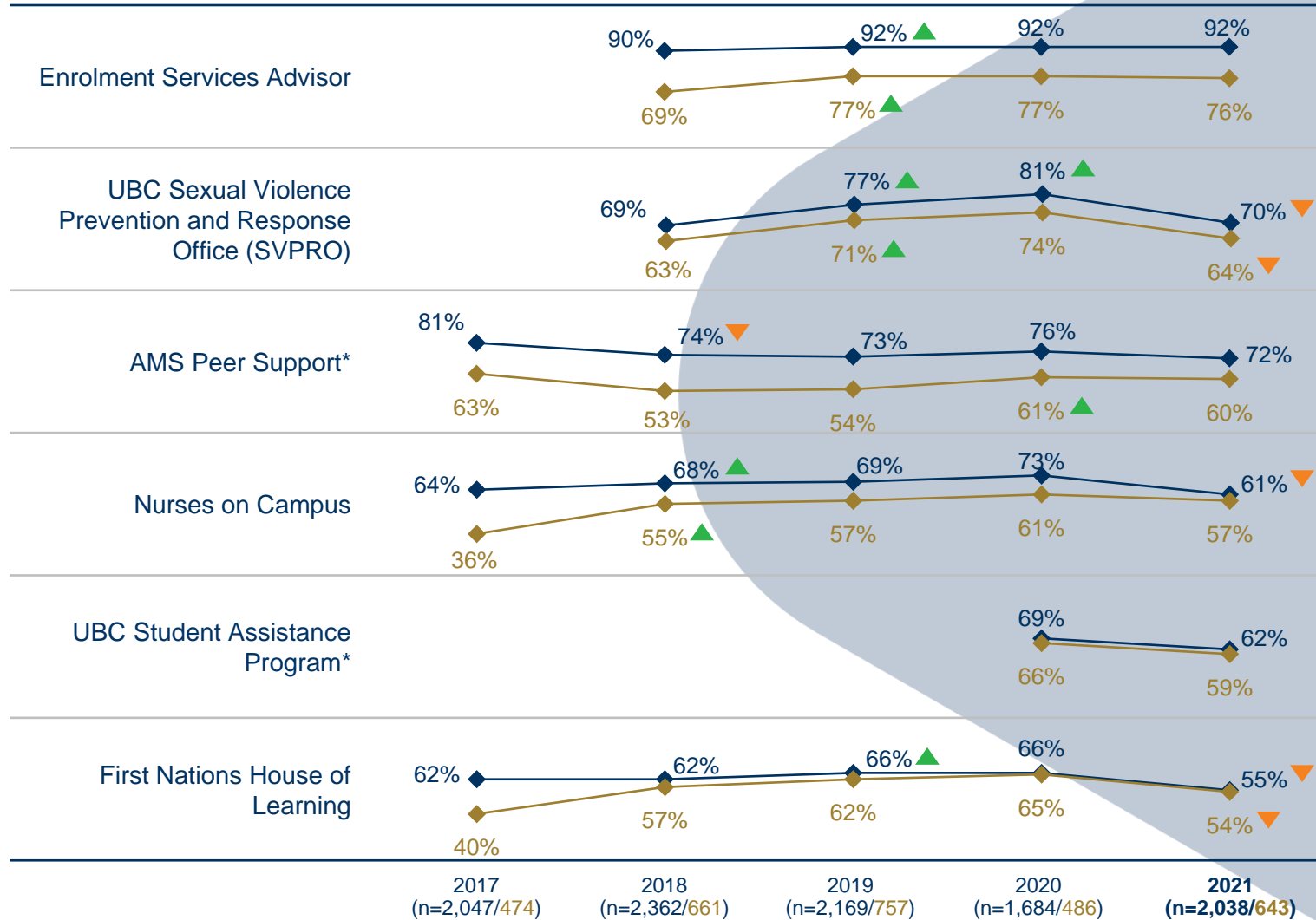
Student awareness of UBC Student Health Services and UBC Counselling services has remained stable.

Awareness of UBC Mental Health/Well-Being Services & Programs *Continued*

Awareness of SVPRO, Nurses on Campus, and First Nations House of Learning has also significantly declined over the past year among undergrads. Graduates also show a significant decline in awareness of First Nations House of Learning.

Enrolment Services Advisor and UBC Student Assistance Program awareness have remained stable.

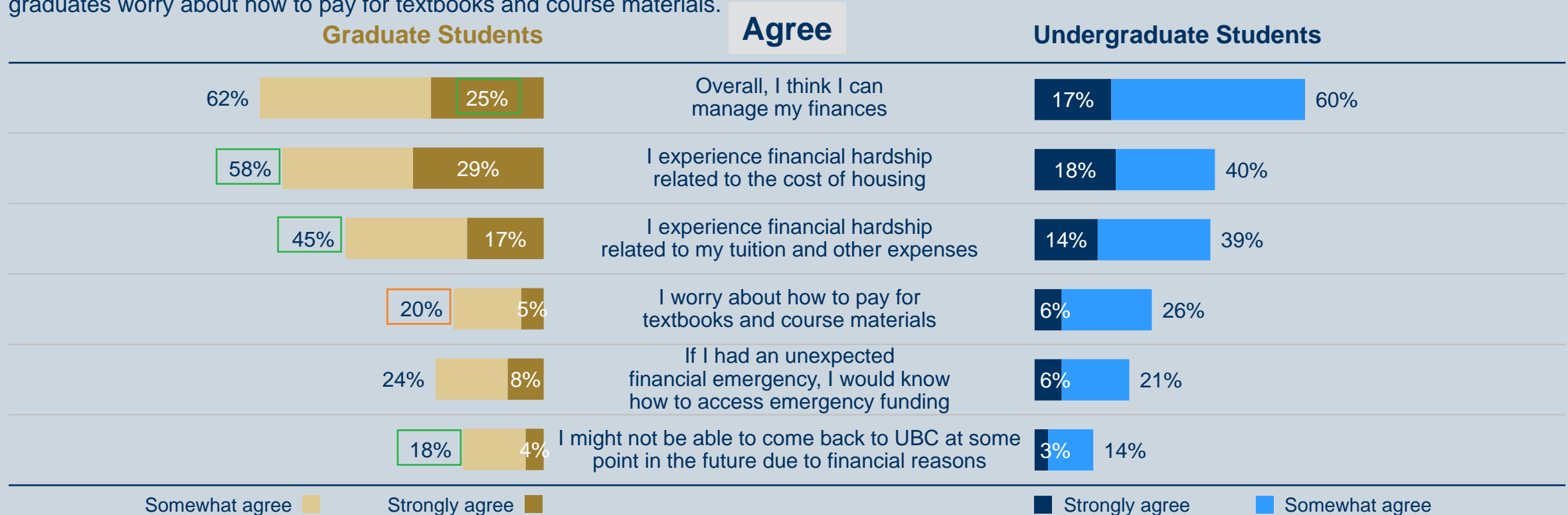

Agreement with Statements About Personal Finances

A majority of undergrads agree that they can manage their overall finances, but 4-in-10 agree that they experience financial hardship (due to cost of housing and tuition). Graduate students are significantly more likely than undergrads to agree that they experience financial hardship related to cost of housing and tuition and other expenses, as well as expressing doubt that they can come back to UBC due to financial reasons. Significantly less graduates worry about how to pay for textbooks and course materials.

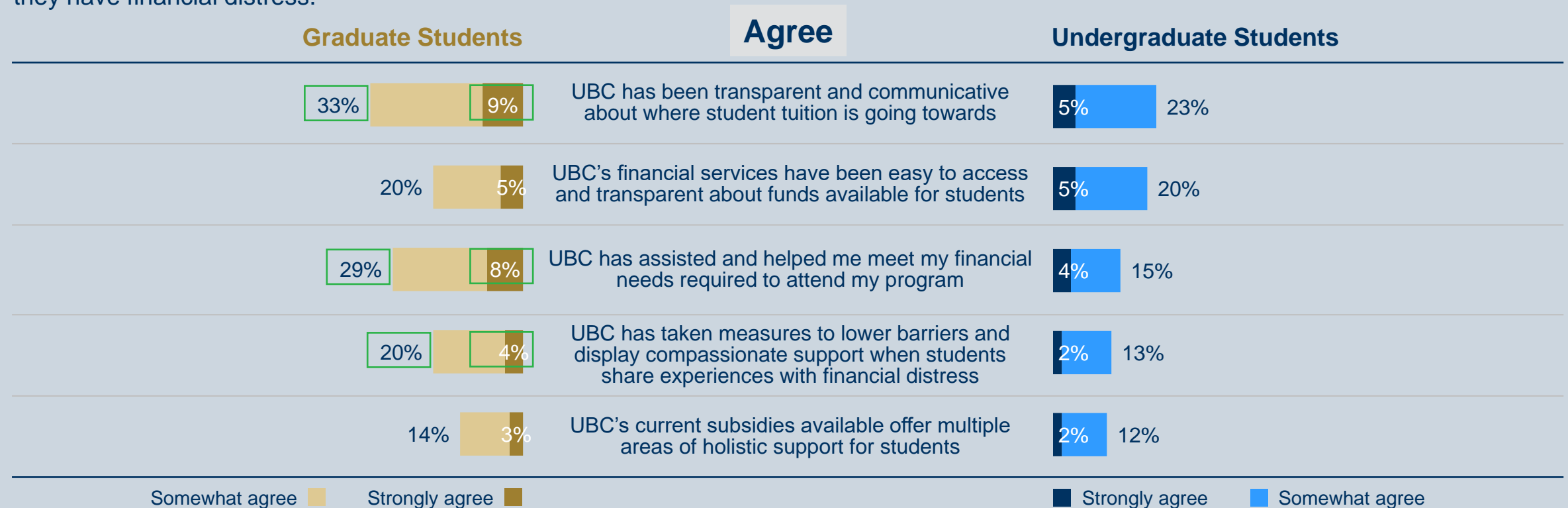

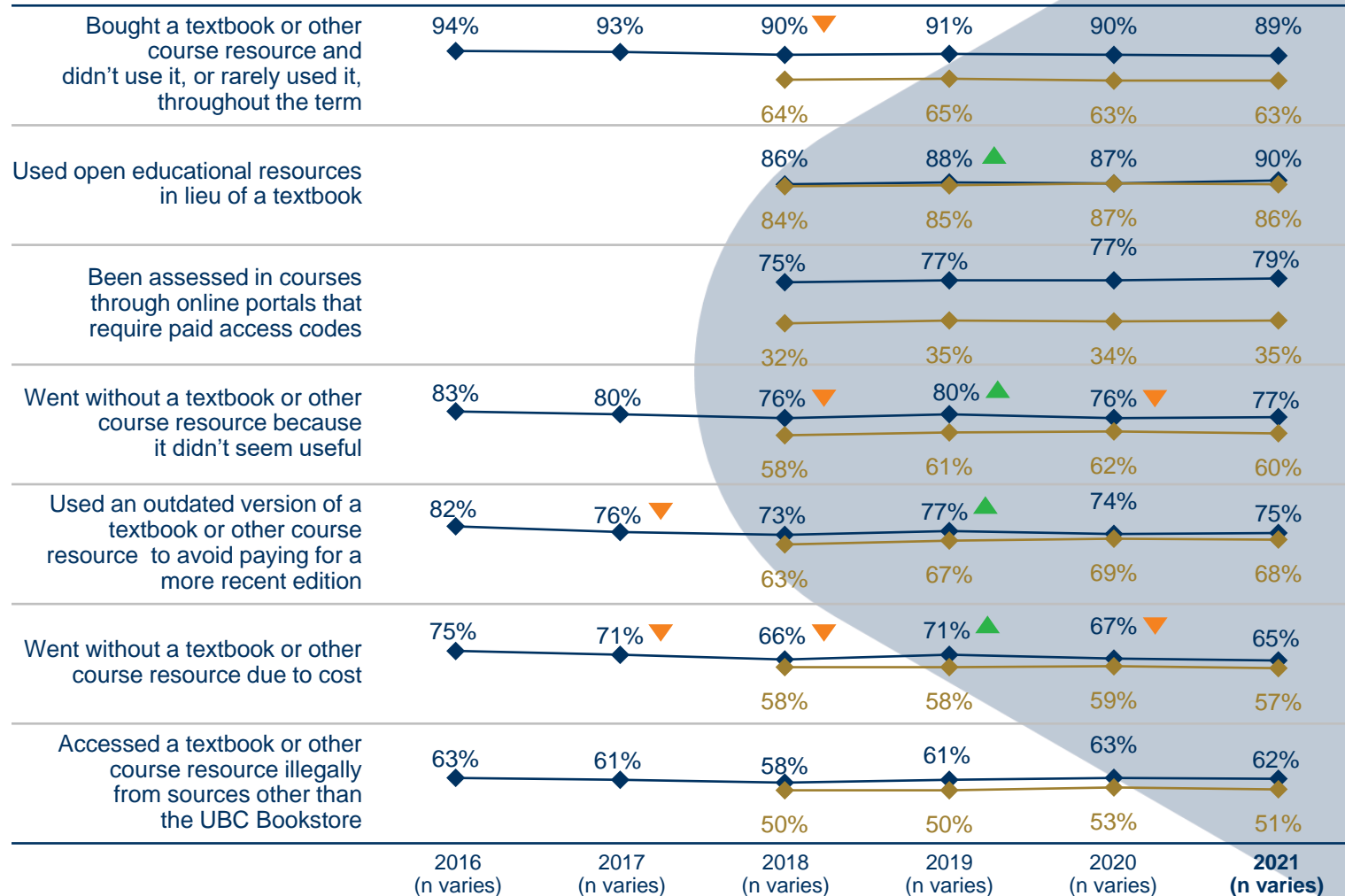
Significantly more graduates than undergrads agree that UBC has been transparent about where student tuition is going towards, that UBC has assisted them to meet financial needs for their program, and that UBC has lowered barriers and given compassionate support when they have financial distress.

There were no significant changes in using alternative approaches to purchasing textbooks over the past year.

Agreement with Statements about Prevalence of Sexual Assault and Misconduct

Half of undergrads and 1-in-5 graduates continue to be concerned about the prevalence of sexual assault and other sexual misconduct at UBC. Significantly more students agree that they would know how to respond appropriately if they witnessed a sexual assault or other sexual misconduct since last year. It should also be noted that the LGBTQ2PA+ demographic is more likely than hetero to be concerned about the prevalence of sexual assault (LGBTQ2PA+: 62% vs. hetero: 47%) and other sexual misconduct (LGBTQ2PA+: 58% vs. hetero: 47%) at UBC.
